Our vision is to renovate Alresford Station House and turn it into a vibrant space for the benefit of the **whole** community.

We are a not-for-profit community benefit society, and we believe that we can rejuvenate the Station House by restoring it and putting it to good use as a community café and community hub.

Following setbacks caused by the pandemic, technical issues (relating to signal cables) and staff changes at Greater Anglia, our project, that began in 2019, to lease the Station House was put on hold.....we are now though pressing ahead with the project.

We do need help – from the community and anyone interested in our project. We have raised some finance from grants, and we will be applying for more grants, but we also need investment from those who want to see the Victorian building restored and put to good use. We have a number of potential investors already registered. It is not just about the money though, volunteers are needed for practical help and also, we need some idea of the numbers of people that would use the facilities, especially the community café, once the house is renovated.

We intend to offer shares in our benefit society and for every pound spent on shares we have a funder that will match that invested pound with another pound. So, to raise an anticipated £100,000 from a shares option we need to have shares bought to the total value of £50,000.

We continue to be remarkably busy with the hall almost at full capacity during weekdays and most weekends seeing at least a 50 % usage. Christmas will of course result in a higher usage leading up to Christmas and as usual the hall will be decorated to enhance the Festive season.

The hall between Christmas and New Year will not be open to allow cleaning and maintenance to be done and to allow the volunteers who do so much to keep the hall operational, a few days off without the 'worry' of the hall.

Thank you, all users, for looking after the hall and leaving it in good condition after the hire, this makes looking after the hall so much easier and of course reduces the cost of cleaning which in turn allows hire fees to be kept at their present levels.

The annual fire inspection completed with new signage and renewed water extinguishers provided.

The Hall mats are now all renewed and the oven has been professionally cleaned. Portable Appliance Testing was completed at the end of November and all Risk Assessments are also complete.

On the Finance side of the house, our new Treasurer is now accessing and authorising our main bank accounts, we need to get signatories up to date and hopefully by the end of the

current fiscal year (ending Feb 24) we will be where we want to be.

SOLAR PANELS -The AVHMC investigating the installation of Solar Panel energy for the village hall. This would assist in keeping the cost down for electricity used in the hall during daytime hires but could also allow either storage of electricity or feeding back into the grid any excess generated during sunshine hours for a fee from the energy supplier which of course would then subsidise night time usage. We are talking to three or four companies on recommendation and in contact with East Hanningfield Village Hall who are already well into the process. Of course, this will also bring the hall more into line with regards to clean and environmentally beneficial energy use.

The Simply Singing has resumed with numbers well over twenty attending and the two film nights have been attended by 35-40 persons. These are very enjoyable events costing just £2.00 for Singing and a donation for the Film night and a chance to socialise and meet new friends. I recommend you give it a go if you are feeling that you need a little boost.

DECEMBER 2023 THOUGHTS ON LIFE AND FAITH WHAT ARE WE WAITING FOR?

As I write these thoughts, I am still preparing for Remembrance Sunday services but when you read them preparations for Christmas will be well underway!

This has made me ponder about preparing for things. Some of us are great planners. We like to have things planned and sorted out well in detail, and in advance. Others of us leave things to the last minute. Apart from an observation that it takes all sorts and that is important to appreciate that other people work differently to us I won't go into the pros and cons of these approaches! I want to consider what it is we are preparing for in the lead up to Christmas.

Many of us get very busy sorting out present buying, food buying, making arrangements to see friends and families, sorting out parties at schools and workplaces etc. In the churches people are also busy preparing for events and activities in the lead up to Christmas - Carol Services in the churches and elsewhere, Nativity and Christingle services, and much more. (See back page, page 8 or our website for what is happening in each of our churches – we would love everyone to be part of these things!)

That is why it is probably quite a good idea that in our churches we don't really start celebrating Christmas until Christmas Eve. The celebrations them go on through January as we focus on different parts of the Christmas story. That is why you will see decorations still up until at least 12^{th} night -6^{th} January and some still up until 28 January!

The time from the beginning of December to Christmas Eve is Advent. And this is not just about calendars – with or without chocolate!! It is about pondering, wondering, contemplating, meditating on what it means that God, the creator of everything, from the smallest sub atomic particles to mountains, planets, galaxies and everything in between, loves creation so much that he became a part of it.

Not just any part of creation but as a human being on our little planet. Our planet where human beings are wonderfully made in God's image but also spectacularly good at messing things up. We have wars, we damage eco systems. We are greedy and sometimes quite mean to other people. We argue, we harbour grudges. We allow huge amounts of poverty, and vast amounts of loneliness to happen.

But God so loved the world – the cosmos, everything that was created, that they, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, chose to be part of it by being born as a vulnerable baby, in occupied territory, in unconventional circumstances. The baby grew and walked about on our planet, seeking to reconcile humanity to itself, to God and to creation. But the forces that separate us from one another, envy, hatred, greed, fear couldn't allow this to happen and the man was executed in a horrible and demeaning way. But that was not the end of the story. Death could not hold this man, this God! He rose, fully alive. Although he did not remain on the earth in his resurrected body, we now have the Holy Spirit present with us as we keep trying to live as Jesus did. We can't separate Christmas from the whole of the Easter story. The hopes and fears of all the years are born in him and remain in him but also in us. That is what we are preparing to celebrate, remember, relive and rededicate ourselves to.

ALRESFORD BIKERS - WINTER IS COMING AGAIN

What a year of contrasts it has been up to now! By the time you read this many of our machines will be tucked up for Winter, snoozing on their battery tenders, wheels up waiting for Spring. You'll all be thinking about Christmas. So, to recap the year: It's been a bit of an up and down year for biking, mostly caused by the weather. We had a nice Spring, a miserably wet midsummer, more heat than ever later in the year, and today it's windy and rainy again. Some poor folks further North have been flooded out, so we're not complaining. Contrasting that with being stuck on the M25 in 34 degrees, even with my mesh suit on, is striking. That was a tough day, but at least the accident, a truck on fire, caused no casualties even though many people, including me, were stricken with dehydration. (And yes, I did have bottled water, but had consumed it all long before we got moving). The Police were fabulous, and pulled all the bikes up to the front and sat us on the hard shoulder, which isn't a hard shoulder anymore, but with a truck on fire, who's arguing! Ten miles of filtering though...... Interestingly, the drivers of the thousands of stranded cars produced the usual crowd of jealous individuals, who think it's great to deliberately close the gaps and try to stop bikers from passing, while all the truckers were the good guys, and did their best to make gaps. Just in case you didn't know, filtering is perfectly legal in this country, and every bike that passes you while you're going nowhere is one less car in front.

We've been out and about quite a lot this year, frequently during the week too, as so many of us are now people of leisure! We've toured Essex and Suffolk, taking in copious amounts of tea and cake along the way, not to mention quite a number of bacon sarnies. Our meetings, though not over-attended, have still taken place and the stories are still coming. A few of us attended the annual Bike Show in London at ExCel, which was great. So many gleaming new bikes to sit on, we couldn't resist. So many cakes in the cafe, likewise! We were represented at Windsor Castle for the Ride of Respect for His Majesty King Charles III, which was a fantastic event. Thousands of bikes from all over the country lined up on The Long Walk was a spectacular sight. Hundreds of Police Officers drafted in from as far away as Southampton, all with nothing to do, led to some fun conversations with them! Some of us toured Scotland again, and Wales again, both of which were great, though Wales was slightly more moist this time. The 20mph law (blanket replacement of all 30's with 20's) came into effect all across Wales the day before we got there, so that provided endless entertainment. After having four years to prepare, there were still roads with both 30 and 20 signs up, depending which direction one went. One we saw had both, in the same direction! Some had 30 painted on the road, but 20 on the signs. It is an extremely expensive and unpopular thing inflicted totally undemocratically. Much like ULEZ in London. We continue to follow our favourite racing team, Team Steinhausen Racing, with one of our members' son racing in sidecars, with some success. Sponsorship is their biggest hurdle. Our long awaited (owing to Covid)



visit to the Essex & Herts Air Ambulance finally happened early in May, and it was great to see the brilliant work being done by the team there. They are always seeking donations too, as they are entirely unfunded save for the charity. And it's not every day you get that close to their helicopters and have the frontline staff tell you all about them and their missions too. Did you know that each of their missions costs on average £2,500? And they did over 120 in September alone? You can see it is an expensive business! A couple of us went to a rainy Mallory Park Race Circuit for the Bike Festival, and bumped into some biking celebrities while there. Luckily it only rained in showers, but they were very


heavy when they came. But standing next to a Suzuki RG500 warming up, as Barry Sheene would have ridden, was a bit special. As well as the other really memorable bikes, such as BSA Rocket 3's, Triumph Tridents, Honda 4's and all from the 60's and 70's, it was very reminiscent to get a good nose full of Castrol R, and racing two stroke exhaust. I was back in my boyhood immediately. Having myself marshalled that track many times some years ago, with the current rules in place, it was amusing to observe the travelling marshals. In parades such as these, they lead the pack out, and tail the pack so as not to have any stoppages on the track go unattended. The marshals are no slouches either! One by one the old racers overtook them, showing that even on last year's bikes, the old geezers on Manx Nortons and so on left them for dead! Race regulations do not apply to parades, and the marshals just waived them on. Copdock Bike Show was massive, and another great day out for all the family, bikers or not. There is something there for everyone, including this year some electric bikes. There were also a number of displays, and one was some very young kids riding trials type bikes over obstacles, and those little bikes were electric too. The little kids loved it. And the exhibition display bikes took many of us back to our biking youth, and beyond! There was some real exotica there, including a 100 year old AJS, beautifully restored. During the Summer I personally tried to record my best MPG, and hit 179 miles at 65.7 miles per gallon. Why do I need an electric bike? I don't. An electric bike would have spent longer charging than I took for the whole thing! We've done a lot of home-mechanics, servicing our bikes at rather less cost, and enjoying doing our own maintenance. It always helps to know exactly how something works because you can enjoy the satisfaction of having done it yourself. I had Bismarck up on the lift and changed a few tyres myself this year too. Is it me, or don't they last like they used to? (For those who may not know, 10,000 miles on modern tyres is very good going, and I've racked up more than 12,000 so far....). Mind you, they grip like Velcro compared to what I started out with, eeeek, almost 50 years ago! Continued on next page



Vehicles are parking on **junctions** and **footpaths**, which causes obstruction and danger to the safety of others. These are both offences under the Highway Code.

This can also damage pavements and kerb stones in time, which costs money too replace and dissatisfaction to residents for looking unsightly in the village.

If you receive any calls like this, report to action fraud advising them what telephone provider you use. Or copy paste email and attach it to the online report.

Suspicious circumstances

If you see anything that does not look right, report it. Try and get as much information as you can, including registration numbers, which are key to a lot of activity. The more you have, the more chance we have of a positive investigation, with results.

Child Car Seats

A child's car seat may be the most important safety device you ever provide for your child. Even in a minor collision an unrestrained child may be thrown about inside the vehicle, injuring themselves and others. They could also be thrown from the car through one of the windows.

In the United Kingdom it is estimated that approximately seventy five percent of all child car seats in use are incorrectly fitted, incompatible with the car or van or inappropriate for the child.

There is a huge variety of seats to choose from for different weights and ages; every seat has different installation instructions which need to be followed carefully. ALRESFORD PARISH COUNCIL Chairman's Report December 2023 / January 2024

Awards!

At the October awards ceremony held by The Essex Playing Field Association in Chelmsford, Alresford Parish Council won the competition for the Best Kept Playing Field in Essex.

This achievement bears testament to the input from Councillors, staff, contractors and the volunteers from Alresford Colne Rangers Football Club who have worked hard to provide the community with the very best facilities.

This is the second year in succession that Alresford has won the overall title and that feat of consecutive wins has not been achieved before by any Council in the long history of the competition. The judging covers all aspects of a playing field including building maintenance, play area upkeep and the cleanliness of the site. Well done also to our village PCSO who keeps a watchful eye on everything. That incredible award was not the only achievement — Alresford Parish Council came runner up as having the best kept child's play area in Essex and there was a gold standard award for the football pitch.

Highways

The main repairs to the carriageway in Wivenhoe Road have been made and it seems the petitioning by the Parish Council for these much needed improvements has paid off together with supportive input from our County Councillor Alan Goggin.

Damaged and missing signage on the B1027 is to be attended to next and to make sure these works are undertaken in a timely manner the Parish Council is obtaining quotes as Essex Highways has not been able to schedule in the necessary works to date.

Flooding continues to be a great concern at several locations including Ford Lane, Heath Road and Wivenhoe Road. Inspections have been called for on a number of occasions and have been carried out but as yet only limited remedial action has taken place by Essex Highways – possibly due to the high cost of drain replacement.

Vehicle Activated Sign (VAS)/Speeding

More complaints are received by the Parish Council about speeding vehicles than on most other matters. The new VAS unit was mounted in October at the junction of Crestlands and Wivenhoe Road to remind motorists of what speed they are travelling at as they near the roundabout junctions. The device display is triggered by any vehicle that approaches at a speed greater than 27mph, however anonymised data is collected on every vehicle that passes whether the sign is triggered or not. The data is downloaded by Bluetooth technology and software analyses all the information collected. The average speed of vehicles recorded by the new unit is 27.1mph with the 85th percentile speed being 32.3mph (85th percentile data excludes those few vehicles that go very slowly or very quickly). A 14% reduction in speed has been achieved as readings were taken on other devices before the VAS was installed.

Cockaynes Lane

An application is being made by the Parish Council for Cockaynes Lane to be designated as a "Quiet Lane". This designation is really linked to the concept of signage warning users of the shared nature of the road as it carries lorries, cars, pedestrians, cyclists and horse-riders without any footpaths and only limited passing places. It is not an easy

application to make to ECC Highways as Road Traffic Act criteria has to be met and Highways licences obtained.

Bus stop shelters

Solar lighting is to be fitted to both bus shelters as previous installations have failed. It has been difficult to locate the specialist electricians prepared to undertake this type of work but our CCTV contractor has recently integrated a specialist highways electrician into his firm who will undertake the job.

Social matters and Policing

Parish and Town Councils are partner organisations with the Police and it is good to have Police attendance at Council meetings from time to time, for updates and exchanges of information.

Sgt Vanessa Moss from the Community Policing Team and our very own PCSO Julia Brandon attended the November meeting and gave a full crime report update before taking questions from Councillors. Questions included matters relating to inconsiderate parking, the unlawful use of Nitrous Oxide and the prevalence of credit/debit card scams locally.

St Peter's Churchyard/Field footpaths

Vegetation growth in the churchyard is a challenging issue . The active part of the churchyard and some other parts come under the jurisdiction of the Parochial Church Council and some areas can be attended to (in law) by the Parish Council. The Parish Council has voted to extend the area it covers so that further tidying can be undertaken. Some areas of course are deliberately left naturally wild to encourage wildlife habitats to thrive but there has to be a balance and the Council is doing what it legally can to improve the site.

The Parish Paths Partnership volunteer Andrew Barker continues doing a sterling job on many field footpaths that would be impassable without his hard work and the Council is immensely grateful for all he and his helpers accomplish.

Christmas Tree

The Alresford Parish Council Christmas Tree will once again be in place outside the shops in Station Road. Children will be encouraged to join in the decoration of the tree. There is also an invitation to hang a bauble as a memorial to a loved one that has passed away. Further information will be available in due course on the Parish Council website and on social media.

And finally....

Councillors certainly miss our colleague John Housden – he will be remembered for his depth of knowledge, his charity work and his gentle, mischievous humour. His family will likely set a date in the new year for a local memorial service (his funeral took place in London).

As we head into the New Year the Council can look back positively on a number of accomplishments over the past year, including the significant improvements to the main village play area with new play equipment and new seating installed. 2024 will no doubt bring new challenges and the Council is well placed with it's high calibre of staff to deliver a quality service to the community.
