

ST ANDREW'S REFLECTIONS

Thoughts on life and faith In the ancient world - Might was right.

A historian has recently described the ancient Roman Empire as a Carnivore, like a T Rex of the dinosaur kingdom. Strangely though - for all the might, it was not a terrible foe that destroyed the empire but a wandering Galilee preacher. The very person that had been crucified by this all conquering empire inspired his followers that after a couple of centuries of persecution witnessed the Roman Empire convert to Christianity.

Interestingly, for all the power plays of the Roman Empire, I would argue that it was some of the more subtle qualities of Jesus that won people over. Aside from some of the greatest teaching that have come from the lips of a human being, leaving out the miraculous claims there was a core quality to Jesus - he was gentle and humble.

Jesus kept sight of the lowliest in society and was affected by the suffering he saw - yes he would challenge the powerful strongly but overall there was a loving gentleness and despite his brilliance a lowly spirit. At the critical moment where he was to show his disciples how to lead - he would pick up a towel and a bowl of water and wash his disciples feet - the job of a lowly servant! The might of the Roman Empire meant that Jesus was crucified for blasphemy. His claim to be the son of God signing his death warrant.

All this would be a side note in history if it wasn't for the scandalous Christian claim that Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Day. In Jesus life we have someone who appears to lose everything before gaining everything. In his early followers they lose everything to gain eternity.

Perhaps in the eyes of the brash, to be gentle and lowly are the hallmarks of a "loser" but history tells us otherwise - even the might of Rome bowed the knee to the life of the wandering Galilee preacher.

Amidst the challenges of life - what do we need to lose to gain? How can we be "gentle and lowly" - it may feel like we are losing but history actually tells a different story.

HEARING LOSS Do You Live in a hearing loss world?

I do, I am now clinically diagnosed as profoundly deaf. As a retired Senior Nurse, I had never appreciated just how isolating and embarrassing hearing loss can be on one's life. I can no longer hear the telephone, doorbell, fire alarm or the sound from the TV. More importantly I cannot hear conversations, so my social life is disappearing. My hearing aids help but I also need other equipment/help.

Statistics state 12 million adults in the UK, that's 1:5 have hearing loss and 50,000 children. 70% are over 65, sadly many 'tolerate' it.

There is help available and often at no cost. A GP request for a referral to an audiologist is a telephone call away. There is no age limit. NHS hearing aids have come a long way since the ear trumpet, I am pleased to say, and are free as are the batteries. Audiology appointments for adults are no longer at the hospital, companies such as Specsavers/Scrivens are now contracted to the NHS for this service.

The fire brigade offers a service to those who have hearing problems, fitting fire alarms and an alarm which will wake you should an alarm go off at night. Essex County Council have a team of support workers (ECL Sensory Team 03330133262). The team can provide equipment which makes life easier at home, such as knowing when the doorbell rings or the telephone. There is no charge for this service, it is funded from Essex County Council.

Did you know that a disability railcard can be purchased (£20 per year), which allows you discount on your rail ticket, plus discount for 1 person travelling with you (escort). This helps when an announcement is made at stations or on board the train.

Do seek help, it is there for the asking and can improve the quality of your life and those around you.



ALRESFORD PARISH COUNCIL Chairman's Report

Overview:

Well, quite an eventful summer weather-wise this year, with the hottest June on record. The well attended Picnic in the Park village event was just a perfect day with a cooling breeze taking the edge off the very high temperatures.

The Council has been busy trying to keep up with all the demands of a rapidly expanding village, we have met with Tendring District Council officers, Councillors and Taylor Wimpey management to discuss the final stage of the hand over of the public open spaces on the Cockaynes North site. Hopefully (and at last) we can soon have responsibility for the grass cutting and grounds maintenance. There are still some ongoing planning issues with the south site and so that area will inevitably lag behind the north site in the handover process.

It has been really encouraging to receive messages of appreciation for some of the recent works at the playing field and around the village as we strive to continue various improvement projects.

Planning:

There are immense frustrations felt by Parish Councillors when it comes to some planning issues. We all try to do what is best for the village when we are consulted about planning applications but at times interpretation of planning policy by Tendring Council officers overrides our views. A meeting was held between Alresford Parish Council representatives and the Director of Planning at Tendring as we felt that agreed principles and policy in the Neighbourhood Plan and Local Plan were being circumvented as many decisions were being made by lone planning officers on important issues and those decisions were not in line with our understanding of agreed policies. The meeting went well and assurances were given that the hard won policies would be referred to when officers and planning committees decide planning applications in future.

VAS Wivenhoe Road:

We have taken delivery of the Vehicle Activated Sign unit destined for the corner of Crestlands and Wivenhoe Road – this unit will warn drivers to slow down if they exceed the speed limit. Fitting may take a little while as there are a number of underground cables to locate before the supporting post can be put in place but we trust the unit will be functioning by the autumn/winter. Some drivers just do not realise the dangers of excess speed in residential areas and they need reminders and at times enforcement. On a recent traffic police visit to Alresford three vehicles were noted travelling between 40 and 50 mph along Wivenhoe Road at the school pick-up times.

The Environment and Public Realm:

The playing field grass is now receiving the benefit of being watered from the new borehole arrangement that is in place. Borehole water is stored in tanks and then used in the dry conditions. Over the years this will mean greatly reduced water bills and it is a much more sustainable way of irrigating the grass. Temporary toilets on the playing field will be in place over the school summer holidays and the plan is to have a permanent toilet block when funding is secured. For the pavilion building itself solar panels are now being considered.

Tree planting around the village has been somewhat delayed due to the new licensing arrangements operated by Essex Highways. The application process to plant highways trees now requires a visit from the county arboriculturist for each tree, plus detailed planting and maintenance plans.

Highways/Parking issues:

Complaints about inconsiderate driving in Cockaynes Lane have increased and the B1027 speed limit issue through the village remains unresolved. Essex Highways are reluctant to act in either case but the Council is keeping up it's campaign to improve road safety.

Parking issues in Station Road, Cox Road and Ford Lane are often brought to the attention of the Parish Council – some of the issues are avoidable if drivers park with due consideration. Parking across a dropped kerb can elicit a £90 fine.

Uneven road surfaces and potholes in Wivenhoe Road and faded white lines have been matters raised with Essex Highways and action is finally being taken by them to address the problems. Surprisingly though some white lining has been carried out before carriageway repairs have been undertaken!

Four Year Plan:

Council planning for the four year period of office is underway and projects will be discussed in the coming months.

In conclusion:

Many thanks to all the village volunteers who do so much. A special mention to those that are helping with litterpicking, wonderful to see parents with young children out and about clearing up the village and the surrounding area. A shame that so many people drop litter in the first place of course. Those that organised the Picnic in the Park must also receive due recognition, it requires a great deal of planning nowadays to organise community events due to safety rules and securing bookings - so well done to the Fete Organising Group.

And finally.....well done to fellow Councillors and Staff of Alresford Parish Council for all you do to play your part in supporting the community.



For June's meeting we welcomed Doctor Chris Gibson to give his talk on "Gardening for Wildlife". Chris highlighted the types of plants that were important to support all forms of garden wildlife be it as a food source or simply as shelter. Special consideration was given to those plants that can adapt to the ever increasing hot and dry conditions, and interestingly the need to be less fussy about tidying the garden, by leaving areas that provided the best conditions for wildlife to flourish. Chris also explained the work he does in conjunction with Beth Chatto Gardens. We look forward to welcoming Chris back to the club in October when he will be giving a talk on Essex Wildflowers.

Our speaker for the July meeting was Ed Fairey who gave both an informative and humorous talk on the National Garden Scheme from its beginnings in the early 1900's to date. I for one had little idea of how the NGS was formed and how in 1927 some 349 gardens opened to the public. This was to raise funds for the Queens Nursing Institute (QNI), which supports community nursing. Whist the QNI is still a major beneficiary of the NGS, it now also supports a large number of charities such as Macmillan Nursing and various hospices. The talk included details of how Ed and his wife had transformed their present gardens at Mayfied Farm, Ardleigh into a 12 acres of extensive and varied planting. 

ALRESFORD BIKERS

Many of us are racking up the miles while the sun is out (and sometimes when it's not!). We've visited many of our usual haunts this year already, and discovered a couple of nice new places to visit on sunny Sundays too. Enjoying the summer, before the weather closes in again, we're heading off to places we like and riding great roads (carefully on our tarmac moonscape), and meeting with like-minded riders all over the county, and beyond. We recently had the great pleasure



of a tour of the Essex and Herts Air Ambulance facility at Earls Colne, which I had booked nearly three years ago, thanks to Covid, making a small donation to help keep them airborne. It has become one of our de facto charities that we support, and take part in the legendary Air Ambulance Run in September too. Those guys and gals need all the cash they can get - the price of jet fuel has gone up even more than our petrol.

There has been the normal Spring frenzy of MOT tests and maintenance before taking trips, the usual round of servicing as the mileage climbs in the good weather. We've had a couple of very enjoyable mid-week rides out too, as well as a few of us going on longer trips away. We're heading off to a classic race meeting at Mallory Park soon, which will have passed by the time you read

this so watch the next issue! So, the mileage is rising steadily over the summer, and because of that some of us are beginning to notice the rising costs of consumables as inflation hits us like everyone else. Tyres, brake pads, petrol and oil, and the cost of servicing have all gone up like everything else. A pair of tyres recently cost me half what I paid for my first brand new bike! Mind you, that was far too many years ago! So I've done a lot more DIY servicing than I have had time for in the past, and even my bike lift has been out twice this year already. There is something quite weird about picking up a quarter tonne bike and seeing it a hovering metre in the air! Scrabbling around on the ground trying to reach sump drains and exhaust bolts is getting more difficult as I get older, and I know I'm not the only one! It's quite fun doing your own maintenance, and having had a Dad who taught me from about 4 years old all helps even now. Several of us do much of our own servicing and maintenance these days, and always have, but to be honest, the amount of stuff we

can't do any more is growing. I haven't set a pair of points for at least 40 years already, though that is a relief. Where might once have used things like colour charts on spark plugs, sniffed oil or let it settle out to find contaminants (usually condensation), or run it through a strainer (Chamois leather is best) to see any metallic particles, or fitted a magnetic sump bolt to catch swarf, or used a stethoscope or listening stick (ask your grandad) to diagnose rumbling bearings, slapping pistons, or worn valves, now I have to get a proper certified engineer to plug Bismarck into a laptop and run a series of checks. But it can check my entire machine's system and reveal any faults much faster than I can. It can pick up a worn spark plug, or clogging air filter, without me even looking. And the results are not written down anymore; they're beamed back to the manufacturer. I recently had a fuel injection system rebalanced entirely without the touch



of human hand after plugging in, which was spooky to watch and listen to! Even finding no faults costs money! But, on a nice day, when the sun is out so hot I have my mesh suit on, and can ride round empty roads on a Sunday morning as in the picture, it all becomes worth it.

So if you want experienced hands to help you maintain your machine, or tell you where to get things you need, or advise you if your bike needs help, we're here. We've busted or worn out most things. We've all had a puncture at the worst possible time, and fixed it. We've had failures of light bulbs, fuses, even brake cables, and replaced them. We've all helped some poor wretch at the side of the road with rained out ignition, or run out of petrol, or a flat tyre in the customary monsoon. We've had kit failures, little get-offs, and weathered the appalling standards of road maintenance and other road user's unbelievable stupidity sometimes too. I have even had a bee fly in my helmet once, which was "interesting". And a Pheasant once came through my windscreen too. That bird even had the cheek to unbolt a mirror, and hit my kill switch as it destroyed well over a hundred pounds worth of plastic screen too! All these "war stories" and more are right here, in our HQ, The Pointer Inn, on the second Tuesday of every month, at 8pm, where Neil and Sam always make us welcome. So if you like bikes, or want to learn more, or just have a bikey chat, come and meet us, we're quite friendly and you'll be made most welcome!


